create barriers to equitable rural development.

- vii. Inadequate medical facilities:** Poor health outcomes and low labor productivity are caused by a lack of hospitals physicians, medications, and sanitary facilities.
- viii. Inadequate execution of government programs:** The efficacy of rural development initiatives is diminished by issues like corruption, ignorance, bureaucratic hold-ups, and inadequate oversight.
- ix. Environmental difficulties:** Sustainable rural development is seriously threatened by deforestation, water scarcity, soil erosion, and climate change.

Rural development faces multidimensional challenges that require integrated efforts involving government, local institutions, NGO's, and community participation. Sustainable and inclusive strategies are necessary to overcome these obstacles.

3. Role of Government in Rural Development:

farmer's income, the government offers credit, crop insurance, irrigation facilities, subsidies, minimum support prices and extension services.

- iv. **Human resource development:** Investment in rural education, skill development, healthcare, nutrition and digital literacy improves the quality of rural human capital.

- vi. **Employment generation programs:** Schemes such as rural employment guarantee programs help to create job, reduce poverty, and prevent urban migration.
- vii. **Poverty alleviation and social welfare:** The government implements poverty eradication programs, food security schemes, pensions and assistance for women, children, the elderly and marginalized communities.
- viii. **Promotion of rural industries:** Cottage industries, self-help groups, cooperatives, and small-scale industries benefit from training, financing, and market access.
- ix. **Decentralization and local government:** Strengthening panchayati raj institutions allows people to participate in the planning and implementation of rural development programs,
- x. **Monitoring and evaluation:** Through regular monitoring and evaluation, the government ensures that schemes are transparent, accountable, and implemented effectively.

- **PMGSY:** this program provide all-weather road connectivity to unconnected rural habitations, thereby improving socio-economic development, access to markets, health, education and empowering rural populations through better infrastructure.
- **Gram Panchayats:** important grassroots development plan implementers.
- **Pradhanmantri Awaas Yojana Gramin:** this scheme houses provides to below poverty line people.
- **Public Distribution System:** public distribution system has evolved as a system of management of scarcity through distribution of food grains at affordable prices. PDS has important part of government's policy for management of food economy in the country.
