- **Market Linkages** - Market linkages refer to connecting rural producers directly with markets through cooperatives, digital platforms, and supply chains to ensure fair pricing.

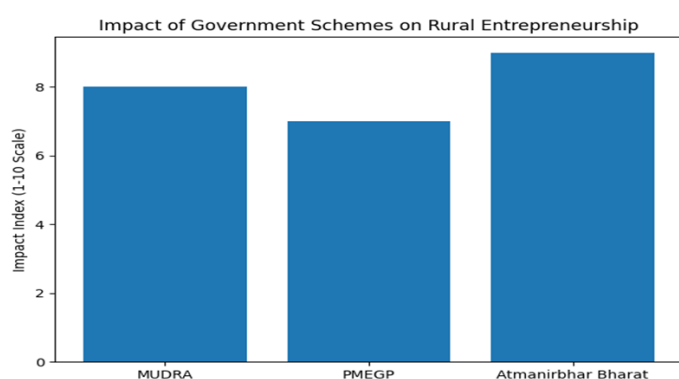
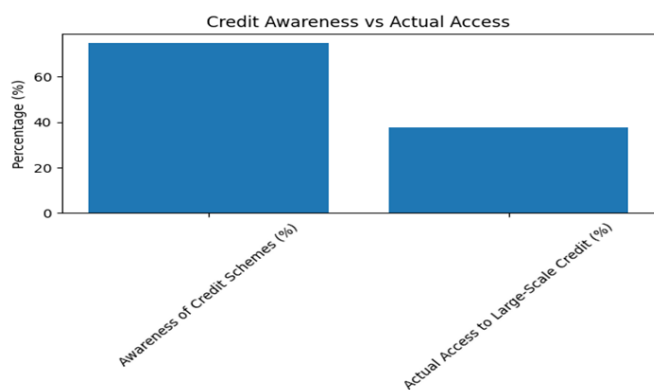
Research Methodology:
